Missions — Being a blessing or being blessed?



It doesn't matter what your age is or if you have a family—you can go on the mission field and come home more blessed than the blessing you were while there.

Marcella Borgschatz of Minnesota spent one month working with the destitute pre-schoolers at El Pozito in Tijuana, Mexico. Marcella says "the best part of my trip was working together with some very special people to make a difference in the lives of many children." She fell in love with one-year-old Israel (left) whom she nurtured, loved and gave encouraging words so he would eat. While she was there his health improved and he

began to gain weight, becoming very active and everyone's friend. Marcella encourages those going on the mission field to be prepared for a challenge. "The work will be hard," she said, "but rewarding." She also suggested to study up on the climate so you take the right clothes and other necessities, and to learn some of the language so it is easier to communicate. Even though language was a barrier for her, she managed to communicate through smiles and signs.

Patrick and Anita Rice from Vermont have been on the Children of Promise mission field four times-Anita to Guatemala and Patrick to Costa Rica, with their children joining them on two trips to Mexico. The latest trip was at Thanksgiving when they took the whole family to Tijuana, Mexico to help in El Pozo. Patrick did a lot of repairs on the buildings and during times of fellowship played his songs for the children. Anita cut hair, filled in for the cook so she could have a day off and helped out in other ways as well. The children enjoyed playing with the children and cuddling the babies.

I didn't feel unsafe at the orphanage. We were picked up almost right after we got off the plane, so we weren't left to fend for ourselves. I would definitely plan a missions trip with COPI again.
